INTRODUCTION

If you are holding this devotional in your hands, I want you to know something from the very beginning: **you were led here**. Not by chance, not by accident, not by random curiosity, but by the gentle, faithful hand of a God who sees you, knows you, and intends to do something fresh in your life.

These 22 days were not written to impress you; they were written to **meet you**:

To meet you in your reflection.

To meet you in your battles.

To meet you in your quiet questions.

To meet you in the places where you've wondered if God still has plans for you.

I know something about seasons like that. I've lived through moments where I wasn't sure if my story could rise again. Moments where I felt hidden, forgotten, unworthy, or worn out. Moments where the weight of what was behind me felt heavier than the hope of what was ahead.

But there is a truth I learned in those seasons; a truth I've carried into every room, every assignment, every chapter of my life:

**God's mercies really are new every morning.
Every sunrise is a fresh invitation from heaven.
Every breath is a reminder that God is not done with you.**

This devotional is built on that truth.

For the next 22 days, we're going to walk together through a journey of **Redemption, Renewal, and Reassignment**; the same journey God walked me through when He rebuilt my life from the inside out.

Redemption: where God restores what broke you.

Renewal: where God breathes life into what grew weary.

Reassignment: where God places purpose on what survived.

My prayer is that as you read, reflect, and write, you will sense God drawing near to you; not with pressure, but with presence; not with condemnation, but with compassion; not with demands, but with direction.

You don't need perfection to begin these 22 days.

You just need willingness.

I bless you with eyes to see what God is doing, ears to hear His voice, and courage to say yes to the new thing He is preparing within you.

May these days awaken hope.

May they restore joy.

May they speak identity.

May they usher you into the forward God is calling you to step into.

I'm honored to walk this journey with you.

DAY 1 THE NEW BEGINNING

Scripture

"Because of the Lord's great love we are not consumed, for His compassions never fail. They are new every morning; great is Your faithfulness."

- **Lamentations 3:22-23**

Devotional

New beginnings often arrive quietly. Not with fireworks or certainty, but with a deep exhale after a year that felt heavier than you expected. Sometimes they come long before you feel ready. Sometimes they come long after you feared they never would.

If you're honest, there are places in your life you've carried into a new season that still feel like they belong to the old one. But that's where God does His most tender work. Not in the places that look polished, but in the places that still ache, still question, still wonder if restoration is really meant for you.

I've learned that God doesn't wait for you to be strong before He starts something new. He waits for you to be surrendered.

There was a night in my own story where I had nothing left: no plan, no strength, no future I could see. And yet heaven met me right there. Not with judgment, but with mercy. Not with pressure, but with compassion. And somewhere in that moment, I realized that new beginnings don't start when your life is perfect. They start when your heart whispers, *"Lord, I need You again."*

That whisper is enough.
Your willingness is enough.
God delights in meeting us at our “not enough” so He can become more than enough.

Today, you begin again; not because the calendar changed, but because His mercies did.

Today's Insight

Every new beginning is built on new mercy.

Reflection

Take a breath and shift from reading to receiving. These questions are written so you can hear your own heart speak. Let each one settle gently, and make space for God to answer you even as you reflect.

Reflection Questions

- 1. What part of my life is quietly asking for a new beginning?*
- 2. What am I still trying to repair in my own strength that God is inviting me to surrender?*
- 3. Where can I sense God whispering, “Let Me begin again with you?”*

Daily Practice

Take five slow breaths. With each exhale, imagine releasing one old weight. With each inhale, receive God's mercy for today.

Write this down: One thing I am ready to release from the old season is _____.

Prayer

Father, thank You for meeting me with new mercies today. I release every part of my life that has grown heavy, weary, or worn. Begin again in me. Restore my hope, renew my strength, and rewrite what I cannot fix on my own. Lead me into the new beginning You have already prepared.

In Jesus' Name, Amen.

Declaration

“I receive God’s new mercies today. This is my new beginning.”

Faith Activation

Choose one item, habit, or thought from the past season that no longer serves who God is calling you to become.

Release it, tear it up, delete it, discard it, and say aloud:

“Today, I begin again.”

DAY 2 THE MIRROR

Scripture

"But we all, with unveiled face, beholding as in a mirror the glory of the Lord, are being transformed into the same image from glory to glory..."

- 2 Corinthians 3:18

Devotional

There comes a moment in every journey where God asks you to look in the mirror. Not to expose you, but to invite you into truth.

For many years, I avoided my own reflection. Not because I didn't know who I was, but because I was afraid of who I had become. When shame or regret has shaped your life long enough, even a mirror can feel like judgment.

But God uses mirrors differently than we do. We look to evaluate. He looks to restore.

The moment I finally stood before the mirror and saw myself... the years of struggle, the weight of decisions, the pain in my eyes, something unexpected happened. God didn't shame me. He met me.

Not with condemnation, but compassion.

Not with judgment, but gentleness.

Not with disappointment, but invitation.

God's reflection reveals what He placed in you before the world ever touched you. When He asks you to "look again," He's not

showing you the person you were. He's showing you the person He's restoring.

Transformation begins when you see yourself the way He sees you: loved, redeemed, becoming.

Today's Insight

Healing begins the moment you dare to see yourself with heaven's eyes.

Reflection

Slow down for a moment. Let the noise quiet around you. These reflections are crafted to help you see yourself more clearly through God's eyes. Listen inwardly, and allow truth to rise without fear or judgment.

Reflection Questions

1. *What have I believed about myself that God never said?*
2. *What part of my reflection have I been avoiding?*
3. *What does God see in me that I struggle to recognize?*

Daily Practice

Stand in front of a mirror today, even briefly. Instead of looking *at* yourself, look *for* God's grace. Notice one thing He has restored in you.

Write this down: One truth about how God sees me that I want to hold onto today is: _____.

Prayer

Lord, help me see myself through Your eyes.

Heal the places in me that have been shaped by lies, labels, or past wounds. Replace every distorted image with Your truth.

Thank You for meeting me with mercy in my reflection.

In Jesus' Name, Amen.

Declaration

"I see myself becoming who God always knew I could be."

Faith Activation

Place your hand gently on your face, not in judgment, but in kindness.

Whisper: ***"God, thank You for restoring my reflection."***

Let that truth soften your heart today.

DAY 3 THE NAME GOD CALLS YOU

Scripture

“Fear not, for I have redeemed you; I have called you by Name, you are Mine.”

- Isaiah 43:1

Devotional

There are names life gives you, names people give you, and names you give yourself. But then there is the name God calls you, and that name carries the power to rewrite every other one.

Some names come from wounds.

Some come from mistakes.

Some come from seasons we barely survived.

But God never calls you by the name of your failure.

He calls you by the name of your future.

There was a time in my life when the names spoken over me were heavy: *broken, lost, addict, inmate, statistic.*

But those were never heaven’s vocabulary. God waited patiently for the day I would finally hear the name He’d been speaking all along: *son, redeemed, chosen, restored.*

God calls you by the name of who you truly are, not who life tried to turn you into.

When God calls your name, it's not just identity; it's invitation. He is calling you into destiny, into purpose, into the life He authored long before anyone else had an opinion about you.

Let today be the day you begin to answer not to the name of your past, but to the name of your purpose.

Today's Insight

Your true name carries your true identity, and God is the One who speaks it.

Reflection

Before you continue, lean in. These prompts are designed to help you hear the name heaven has spoken over you since the beginning. Let each question draw out the identity God is restoring within you.

Reflection Questions

1. *What names from my past still echo in my heart?*
2. *Which of those names has God already redeemed or replaced?*
3. *What new name is God inviting me to answer to today?*

Daily Practice

Speak your God-given name aloud, even if your voice trembles. Names gain strength through repetition.

Write this down: *The name I believe God is calling me by in this season is: _____.*

Prayer

Father, thank You for calling me by name, not the name of my mistakes, but the name of my purpose.

Silence every false identity I have carried, and let the name You speak over me take root in my heart. Teach me to walk boldly in who You say I am.

In Jesus' Name, Amen.

Declaration

“I answer to the name God calls me: chosen, redeemed, and His.”

Faith Activation

Place your hand over your chest and say softly:

“God, name me again.”

Let your spirit receive the identity heaven has been speaking all along.

DAY 4 THE GOD WHO SEES

Scripture

"You are the God who sees me."
- Genesis 16:13

Devotional

There are few wounds more painful than feeling unseen. Maybe you've lived through seasons where your needs were invisible, your pain unnoticed, or your worth unrecognized.

Sometimes life can shape you into believing that your tears, your efforts, or your quiet battles don't matter. But there is never a moment when God's eyes are not on you.

In Scripture, Hagar spoke the words that echo through centuries: "You are the God who sees me." She said them from a desert place alone, dismissed, discarded.

But that's the moment God met her.

He didn't wait for her to return to strength or safety. He found her in the in-between. He spoke to her destiny when she felt directionless. He saw her when no one else bothered to look.

I've lived enough life to know this: sometimes God's gaze is the only thing that keeps you from giving up.

He sees the battles no one knows you're fighting.
He sees the courage it takes for you to keep going.
He sees the quiet ways you show up, the prayers you whisper, the

strength you borrow.

He sees you when you don't feel strong enough to see yourself.

And His seeing is not passive; it's protective.

When God sees you, He surrounds you.

When God sees you, He defends you.

When God sees you, He guides you into the future He's prepared.

Today, let your heart rest in this truth:

You have never been unseen, not for a moment.

Today's Insight

God's gaze is on you even in the places you feel forgotten.

Reflection

Still your spirit for a moment. These reflections will help you notice the places where God has had His eyes on you long before you realized it. Let them guide you into deeper awareness of His watchful love.

Reflection Questions

1. *Where in my life have I felt unseen or overlooked?*
2. *When can I remember God showing up for me in a moment I thought I was alone?*
3. *How is God inviting me to trust that He sees me now?*

Write This Down

One place in my life where I'm choosing to believe "God sees me" is: _____.

Daily Practice

Look for one moment today, however small, where you feel noticed, supported, or remembered. Receive it as a reminder of God's attentive love.

Prayer

*Lord, thank You for being the God who sees me.
You notice every detail of my life - my joys, my struggles, my hidden prayers. Help me rest in the truth that I am never alone.
Let Your gaze anchor me in confidence and peace.*

In Jesus' Name, Amen.

Declaration

“God sees me. God knows me. God is with me.”

Faith Activation

Place your hand over your heart and say quietly:

“God, thank You for seeing me, especially when I didn't see myself.”

Let His presence settle around you like a gentle covering.

DAY 5 THE GOD WHO STAYS

Scripture

"I will never leave you nor forsake you."

- Hebrews 13:5

Devotional

There are seasons in life when you don't just need God to see you. You need Him to stay.

It's one thing to believe God notices your pain.

It's another to believe He refuses to walk away from it.

We live in a world where people leave. Sometimes by choice. Sometimes by circumstance. Sometimes because they simply don't know how to stay close to your broken places.

But God is different.

He doesn't stand at a distance waiting for you to get it together.

He doesn't withdraw when you struggle. He doesn't pull back when you fail. He doesn't get tired of your healing process.

He stays.

He stays in the mess. He stays in the uncertainty. He stays in the questions. He stays in the room when shame tells you to hide. He stays when you're strong and when you're shattered.

In my own darkest moments, when I had nothing to offer, not strength, not righteousness, not clarity, God stayed. Whether I recognized Him or not, He was there. His presence wasn't always loud, but it was loyal.

The God who stays is the God who heals.

The God who stays is the God who restores.

The God who stays is the God who brings you into your purpose.

You don't have to earn His nearness. You don't have to perform to keep His attention. He has already chosen to stay. And He's not leaving now.

Today's Insight

God's presence is not fragile. He stays through every season.

Reflection

As you move into reflection, welcome the stillness. These questions are designed to help you notice the places where God remained when everything else shifted. Let His nearness illuminate your answers.

Reflection Questions

1. *Where in my story can I see that God stayed with me, even when others didn't?*
2. *What moment in my life shows that God didn't walk away from me?*
3. *How is God staying with me in this current season?*

Daily Practice

Throughout the day, whisper “You’re here.”
Not to remind God; but to remind your own heart.

Write this down: *One place where I want to trust more deeply that God is staying with me is: _____.*

Prayer

*Lord, thank You for being the God who stays.
When others walked away, You remained.
When I struggled, You held me.
When I doubted, You didn’t move.
Teach my heart to rest in Your nearness.
Let Your faithful presence be my peace today.
In Jesus’ Name, Amen.*

Declaration

“God stays with me. I am never abandoned.”

Faith Activation

Place your hand gently over your heart and say slowly,
“Lord, stay close. Help me sense Your presence with me today.”

Let that truth draw you into peace.

DAY 6 THE BREAKTHROUGH IN WAITING

Scripture

*"Yet those who wait for the Lord will gain new strength;
they will mount up with wings like eagles;
they will run and not grow weary,
they will walk and not faint."*

- **Isaiah 40:31**

Devotional

Waiting is one of the hardest places to trust God.
Not because God is unfaithful - but because waiting exposes the
places where we want to move faster than His timing.

We often think of breakthrough as sudden, dramatic, immediate.
But most breakthroughs begin long before we see them. They
begin in the waiting.

Waiting is where God strengthens what impatience would weaken.
Waiting is where God shapes what rushing would spoil.
Waiting is where God prepares you for what you prayed for.

I've lived through seasons where I was desperate for change,
when I wanted God to move, open doors, shift circumstances, or
bring clarity *now*.

But those were the seasons where God wasn't just preparing the breakthrough...

He was preparing **me**.

Sometimes the waiting *is* the breakthrough because it is the place where: your faith deepens, your heart softens, your eyes open, your character matures, your dependence on God anchors.

Waiting is not God withholding.

Waiting is God working where you cannot see.

Waiting is the ground where strength grows roots.

You may not feel the shift yet, but heaven has already begun the work.

Your breakthrough is unfolding: quietly, steadily, faithfully.

Today's Insight

God does some of His greatest work in seasons that feel the slowest.

Reflection

Take a gentle pause. These reflections are written to help you notice what God is forming in the waiting. Let patience soften your heart enough to hear what the delay is teaching you.

Reflection Questions

- 1. Where in my life do I feel like I'm waiting for God to move?*
- 2. How might God be strengthening me in this waiting season?*
- 3. What breakthrough might already be unfolding that I cannot yet see?*

Daily Practice

Every time impatience or anxiety rises today, breathe slowly and whisper,

Your timing is perfect, Lord. Let those words re-center your heart.

Write this down: *In this waiting season, I sense God shaping me by: _____.*

Prayer

Father, help me trust You in the waiting.

Strengthen my faith where I feel weary.

Open my eyes to the quiet breakthroughs You are already working. Teach me to rest in Your timing and receive the strength You give as I wait.

In Jesus' Name, Amen.

Declaration

"I am being strengthened in the waiting. My breakthrough is unfolding."

Faith Activation

Hold your hands open for a few seconds - palms up.

Say softly: ***"Lord, I trust what You are doing in the unseen."***

Allow your posture to become your prayer.

DAY 7 THE PROMISE OVER YOUR PAST

Scripture

*"For I know the plans I have for you," declares the Lord,
"plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope
and a future."*

- Jeremiah 29:11

Devotional

No matter how far you've come, there are parts of your past that can still pull at you - memories you'd rather forget, mistakes that linger, seasons that still ache when you revisit them.

But here's the truth: God speaks a promise louder than your past.

Your past may explain some things about you, but it does not define you. It may have shaped your steps, but it cannot cancel your destiny. It may have wounded you, but it cannot silence God's plan for you.

In my own life, my past had a loud voice -
loud enough to convince me my future was already over.
But when God began to speak His promise over me, that voice
grew quiet.
And then it grew powerless.

God never looks at your past and changes His mind about your future. He sees what you've walked through, He knows what tried to break you, and still He says: **"I have plans for you."**

Plans to prosper you, to restore you, to lead you, to redeem what felt wasted, and to fulfill what seemed impossible.

When God speaks a promise, it becomes a covering.

A shield. A lifeline.

A new beginning wrapped in His faithfulness.

Today, let heaven's promise rise above every old memory.

Your past is not your prophecy.

God's word is.

Today's Insight

Your past cannot erase what God has promised.

Reflection

Settle your mind for a moment. These questions will help you see your past through the lens of God's promises instead of your pain. Let each one unfold slowly, bringing light where there was once weight.

Reflection Questions

1. *What part of my past still tries to speak into my future?*
2. *What promise of God do I need to hold over that memory?*
3. *Where do I sense God rewriting my story with hope?*

Daily Practice

Every time a painful memory surfaces today, gently speak a promise of God over it.

Let promise speak louder than the past.

Write this down: A promise God has spoken over my life that I want to stand on today is: _____.

Prayer

Lord, thank You for speaking a promise that is stronger than anything in my past.

Heal what still hurts, redeem what felt wasted, and rewrite every place in my story with hope.

Teach me to stand on Your word and not on my memories.

In Jesus' Name, Amen.

Declaration

“My past is not my prophecy. God’s promise is my future.”

Faith Activation

Hold your hands out as if receiving a gift.

Say quietly:

“Lord, I receive Your promise over my life.”

Let that truth rest on you like a covering.

DAY 8 THE LIFT

Scripture

*"He lifts the poor from the dust
and the needy from the garbage dump.
He sets them among princes
and seats them in places of honor."
- Psalm 113:7-8*

Devotional

There is a kind of lifting only God can do; the kind that doesn't just change your circumstances but raises your spirit, your identity, and your expectation.

Sometimes the heaviest part of life isn't what you carry on your shoulders, but what you've carried in your heart. Disappointment can weigh you down. Loss can weigh you down. Shame can weigh you down. Even blessings that come slowly can feel heavier than you expected.

But God is a lifter.

He lifts you from places you thought you'd never rise from.
He lifts you when your strength feels small.
He lifts you when hope feels thin.
He lifts you not by demanding more from you, but by meeting you right where you bowed low.

In my own journey, there were days I didn't feel strong enough to stand under the weight of my story. I couldn't imagine a future

where I wasn't fighting the same battles.

But God came into those moments and lifted me. Not all at once, but steadily, faithfully, like a father who places his hands under a child's arms and says, "Come on, I've got you."

God lifts you **up**, but He also lifts you **out**: out of hopelessness, out of cycles, out of false identities, out of the burdens you weren't meant to carry.

Today, let your heart rise a little higher.
God is lifting you, and His hands never fail.

Today's Insight

God lifts you not because you are strong, but because He is faithful.

Reflection

Exhale the heaviness. Let your spirit rise a little higher. These reflections will help you notice the places where God has been lifting you softly, consistently, faithfully. Listen upward.

Reflection Questions

1. *Where has God lifted me in ways I didn't recognize at the time?*
2. *What burdens have I been carrying that God is inviting me to release?*
3. *How is God lifting me in this current season?*

Daily Practice

Sit up a little straighter today. Not in pride, but in hope. Let your posture remind your spirit that God is lifting you.

Write this down: Today, I feel God lifting me most in this area:

_____.

Prayer

Lord, thank You for being the One who lifts me.

Lift my spirit where it has grown weary, lift my hope where it has dimmed,

and lift my vision so I can see what You see.

Carry me out of every burden I'm not meant to hold and lift me into the future You have prepared. In Jesus' Name, Amen.

Declaration

"God is lifting me. Hope is rising in me."

Faith Activation

Gently place your hands upward, as if being lifted.

Say softly:

"Lord, raise my heart into Your hope today."

Let that be your quiet agreement with His work in you.

DAY 9: THE TABLE

Scripture

*"You prepare a table before me
in the presence of my enemies;
You anoint my head with oil;
my cup overflows."*

- Psalm 23:5

Devotional

There is something sacred about a table.

A table is where we gather, where we rest, where we receive. It is where God slows us down enough to feed what has been starving - not just our bodies, but our hope, our faith, our belonging.

All throughout Scripture, God meets His people at tables. From Abraham's tent to the Last Supper, from the feeding of the five thousand to communion today, the table is where heaven offers something the world cannot give:
a place to belong.

In my own journey, I sat at tables
I felt unworthy of: places of leadership, influence, grace.
But the truth is, I was welcomed, not because I deserved a seat, but because God prepared one.
God's table is not built by merit; it is built by mercy.

When God prepares a table for you, it is not based on who approves of you.
It is based on who He is.

He sets a table: in the presence of your enemies, in the presence of your doubts, in the presence of your past, in the presence of the lies that said you'd never be more than your struggle.

And at that table,
He restores dignity.
He pours oil. He fills your cup.
He reminds you: "You belong here."

Today, God is inviting you to the table.
Not to strive, but to sit;
not to perform, but to receive;
not to prove yourself, but to rest in His welcome.

Today's Insight

God prepares the place; you simply take your seat.

Reflection

Imagine yourself taking a seat at a table prepared just for you. Let that image soften your heart. These questions are to help you encounter the welcome, belonging, & fellowship God offers.

Reflection Questions

- 1. Where in my life do I feel God inviting me to "sit" instead of strive?*
- 2. What do I need to receive today that I've been afraid to accept?*
- 3. How is God restoring my dignity at His table?*

Daily Practice

Sit at a physical table today - even for one quiet moment.
Place your hands on the surface and whisper,
“Lord, I receive what You’ve prepared for me.”

Write this down: At God’s table, I am welcomed as:

_____.

Prayer

*Father, thank You for preparing a table for me.
Thank You for welcoming me, restoring me, and reminding me
that I belong.
Help me receive Your grace without fear or hesitation.
Let this day be a reminder that Your provision and presence
surround me.
In Jesus’ Name, Amen.*

Declaration

“I am welcomed. I am honored. I belong at God’s table.”

Faith Activation

Sit with your palms open for a moment, as if receiving bread from
God’s hand.
Say gently: ***“Lord, I take my seat at the table You prepared for
me.”***

Let your spirit rest there.

DAY 10: THE GARDEN

Scripture

*"The Lord will guide you continually,
and satisfy your soul in drought,
and strengthen your bones;
you shall be like a watered garden,
and like a spring of water, whose waters do not fail."*

- Isaiah 58:11

Devotional

Your soul is a garden.

Some seasons feel lush and full, but others feel dry, overgrown, or neglected.

And if you're honest, there are areas of your heart that haven't been tended in a while.

Places where disappointment hardened the soil. Places where old wounds grew weeds.

Places where hope stopped sprouting the way it used to.

But here is the truth: **God is a Gardener.**

He does not rush your growth. He does not demand fruit overnight.

He does not shame you for the dry places or the tangled ones.

Instead, He enters gently. He kneels down beside the part of you that feels barren, rolls up His sleeves, and begins to tend the soil of your heart with patience and care.

In my own life, God didn't restore me all at once. He restored me like a garden, turning over soil that had gone untouched, planting seeds of truth where lies once grew, watering dry places with mercy, pulling out weeds without crushing what was fragile.

If you feel like your life is in a "growing season," remember: growing seasons often look messy before they look beautiful.

God is cultivating something in you - and even if you can't see the fruit yet, the soil is already changing.

Today, allow Him to tend what you've been too tired to touch. Let Him soften the hardened places. Let Him pull what doesn't belong. Let Him plant what will grow in due season.

Your life is becoming a garden again.

Today's Insight

God grows what you surrender, and He restores what you release.

Reflection

Breathe in slowly, like drawing in morning air. These reflections invite you to see your soul as soil; tended, turned, watered by God. Let each question show you what He's growing within you.

Reflection Questions

1. *What part of my life feels dry, neglected, or overgrown?*

2. *What might God be trying to cultivate in me right now?*

Daily Practice

DAY 11: THE BREATH OF GOD

Scripture

"Then the Lord God formed man from the dust of the ground and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life, and the man became a living being."

- Genesis 2:7

Devotional

There is a difference between being alive and truly living. You can breathe in air and still feel empty. You can wake up each morning and still feel weighed down.

You can move through a day and still feel like something in you is running low.

But when God breathes into your life, everything changes.

From the beginning of creation, life didn't begin when God formed Adam's body. It began when God **breathed** into him. His breath brought animation, identity, purpose, and power.

God's breath is not oxygen - it is *presence*.

It is the Spirit whispering into places that have felt numb, tired, or exhausted.

It is His life entering the parts of you that feel like they've gone cold.

Throughout my journey, there were seasons where I wasn't just struggling physically -

my spirit was running out of breath. The pressures were heavy. The journey was long. The hope felt thin.

But God breathed.

Sometimes it came through a scripture. Sometimes through a person.

Sometimes through a small moment of stillness where I could finally feel Him near.

That breath brought life where I had none to give myself.

If you feel worn out today or stretched thin, remember:

You are sustained not by your own strength, but by the breath of God.

You don't have to force life to return.

You only need to receive the breath He is already offering.

Today's Insight

You live not by striving, but by the breath God continually gives.

Reflection

Let your next inhale be intentional. Feel it. These questions are crafted to bring you into awareness of God's breath - His life - moving through your story. Receive what rises.

Reflection Questions

1. *Where in my life do I feel like I'm running out of breath?*
2. *How has God breathed life into me in past seasons of exhaustion?*
3. *Where do I need God's breath to revive me today?*

Daily Practice

Take three slow breaths today.

With each inhale say, “**Lord, fill me.**”

With each exhale say, “**Lord, free me.**”

Let this become a simple rhythm of receiving.

Prayer

Lord, breathe on me again.

Restore what has grown tired,

revive what has grown weak,

and fill me with the life only You can give.

Let Your breath strengthen my spirit,

“God is breathing life into me. I rise with His strength.”

Faith Activation

Place one hand on your chest, one on your stomach.

Inhale slowly and whisper:

“Lord, breathe life into me.”

Let His presence fill the places where you feel empty.

DAY 12: THE VOICE WITHIN

Scripture

"My sheep listen to My voice; I know them, and they follow Me."
- John 10:27

Devotional

There is a voice inside you that speaks softer than fear, quieter than worry, and more faithfully than doubt.
It is the voice of God - steady, gentle, present.

But here's the truth many never admit:
Hearing God is not hard.
Trusting what you hear is what takes faith.

His voice does not shout over your life.
He whispers into it.
Not to hide from you, but to draw you close.

I've lived through seasons where I doubted whether I could really hear God.
Not because He was silent, but because my own noise - my anxiety, my past, my assumptions - was louder.
It took time, surrender, and quiet moments of honesty to realize that God had been speaking the whole time.

Sometimes His voice sounds like peace.
Sometimes it sounds like conviction.
Sometimes it sounds like clarity that cuts through confusion.
Sometimes it sounds like a memory He brings back to remind you He was there.

Often, His voice doesn't feel like a voice at all -
it feels like **knowing**.

A deep sense that something is true, right, safe, or sacred.

God's voice is not reserved for the ultra spiritual.

It's for the surrendered.

It's for the listening.

It's for anyone who says,

"Lord, speak - I'm willing to hear You."

Today, trust that He is speaking to you.

And trust that His voice is wiser, kinder, and more familiar than
you realize.

Today's Insight

**God's voice isn't distant - it's the whisper rising inside your
surrendered heart.**

Reflection

*Close your eyes for a moment. Let the world go quiet. These
reflections will help you discern God's whisper beneath your inner
noise. Allow His voice to rise above every other.*

Reflection Questions

1. *What does God's voice most often feel like to me - peace, clarity, conviction, or comfort?*
2. *Where have I sensed God speaking to me lately, even if I doubted it?*
3. *What is God whispering to my heart in this season?*

Daily Practice

Set a 2-minute timer today and sit in silence.

No agenda. Just listening. Let God have space to speak.

Quiet every voice that brings fear, confusion, or distraction.

DAY 13: THE OIL

Scripture

"But you have an anointing from the Holy One, and all of you know the truth."

- 1 John 2:20

Devotional

The anointing of God is not something you earn - it is something He places on your life because He knows what He has called you to carry.

And often, the places where you felt the most pressure are the very places where His oil flows the strongest.

Oil in Scripture represents three things: purpose, power, and presence.

And all three are given to those who have walked through something that should have destroyed them - but didn't.

There were seasons in my life where I didn't feel anointed.

I felt broken, overwhelmed, disqualified.

I saw the cracks, the flaws, the history.

Yet God saw a vessel He could trust.

The anointing doesn't rest on the perfect - it rests on the surrendered.

Oil is produced through pressure.

Gethsemane was a garden of crushing.

Olives must be pressed to release what's inside.

And often, the deepest anointing comes from the deepest surrender.

You may not feel powerful.

You may not feel qualified.

You may not feel chosen.

But God's oil is not based on how you feel - it's based on what He has spoken.

The anointing equips you to do what you could never do alone.

It strengthens you when your strength fades.

It whispers truth when lies shout loudly.

It steadies you when life shakes you.

It carries you where human ability falls short.

You are anointed - not because of your past, but because of your purpose.

Today's Insight

The pressure you survived produced the oil you carry.

Reflection

Still your hands and your thoughts. These reflections will help you notice where God's anointing has rested, even when you didn't feel qualified. Let each question reveal the oil you carry.

Reflection Questions

1. *Where have I felt the most pressure in my life - and how might God have used that to produce oil in me?*
2. *What assignment has God anointed me for in this season?*

3. *What evidence do I see of God's presence strengthening what I could not do alone?*

Pay attention today to one moment where you sense God strengthening you beyond your natural capacity. Acknowledge it as the oil at work.

DAY 14: THE OPEN DOOR

Scripture

"See, I have placed before you an open door that no one can shut."

- Revelation 3:8

Devotional

There are moments in life when God opens a door so clearly that you know it wasn't your strength, your resume, or your effort that made it possible.

It was grace - pure and simple.

And there are other moments when you're standing in a hallway, waiting for a door to open, wondering if God has forgotten you, misled you, or changed His mind.

But here's what I've learned:

When God opens a door, nothing can close it.

And when God closes a door, nothing is meant to force it open.

God's doors are not random. They are precise.

They open into purpose, healing, growth, and identity.

They appear at the right time, not the rushed time.

There were seasons in my life when I thought God wasn't moving, but in reality, He was preparing the door: shaping it, positioning it, aligning it with the next version of who I was becoming.

Sometimes the greatest act of faith is not walking through the door.

It's recognizing which door is from God and which isn't.

Some doors look good but lead to old patterns.

Some doors look hard but lead to transformation.

Some doors look small but open into wide places.

And some doors, the ones God opens, change everything.

If you are in front of a closed door right now, don't panic.

Closed doors are just as merciful as open ones.

God is not denying you; He is directing you.

Today, trust this: God's timing is perfect.

God's leading is intentional.

And God's door will open, at the moment you are ready to walk through it.

Today's Insight

If God opens a door, no one can close it. If He closes it, no one can force it open.

Reflection

Pause at the threshold of this moment. These reflections are written to help you recognize the doors God is opening, and the ones He's gently closing. Let clarity come as you consider each question.

Reflection Questions

1. *What doors in my life are opening right now - whether quietly or clearly?*

2. *What door might God be closing for my protection, not my punishment?*
3. *Which door requires courage for me to walk through?*

Daily Practice

Notice every moment today where you feel a small nudge, whisper, or pull.

These are often the hinges of God's open doors.

Give me wisdom to recognize Your way, courage to walk through the doors You open,

Stand in a doorway today - any doorway - and pause for three seconds.

DAY 15: THE CALL

Scripture

*"Then I heard the voice of the Lord saying,
'Whom shall I send? And who will go for us?'
And I said, 'Here am I. Send me!'"*

- Isaiah 6:8

Devotional

There is a moment in every believer's life when God's call becomes personal.

Not theoretical. Not distant. Not something reserved for "special" people, but a holy summons that reaches into your story, your wounds, your strength, and your future.

The call of God rarely comes when you feel qualified. In fact, it often arrives in the most unlikely seasons when you feel unsure, unseen, unprepared, or unfinished.

That's because calling is not about perfection. It's about *availability*.

God doesn't wait until you have it all together. He calls you because He is the One who will hold you together.

In my own life, the call didn't come in a moment of success. It came in a moment of surrender. When I finally realized that what God wanted was not my strength but my "yes."
That's when everything changed.

The call is not always loud. Sometimes it's a whisper.
A tug. A burden. A thought you can't shake. A compassion that
keeps pulling at your spirit.
A sense that you were made for "more," even if you can't define it
yet.

God's call is not an event, it's an awakening.

He calls you to Himself,
and then He calls you to the work He prepared for you long before
you knew His name.

Today, don't focus on the details of the call. Focus on the posture
of your heart.

A surrendered heart hears God clearly. A willing heart moves
when God whispers.

Your "yes" may feel small,
but heaven builds whole futures on small yesses.

Today's Insight

God doesn't call you because you are ready. He calls you
because you are willing.

Reflection

*Quiet your heart. These questions are crafted to help you hear the
subtle tug of God's calling in your life. Lean into the invitation. Let
it become unmistakable.*

Reflection Questions

1. *Where do I sense God calling me, even quietly in this season?*

No conditions. No explanations. Just a surrendered yes.

in all your ways submit to Him,
and He will make your paths straight."*

Devotional

Crossroads are sacred places.

Not because they are comfortable, but because they are clarifying.

A crossroads is where two paths stretch before you: one familiar, one unknown.

One rooted in past patterns, the other calling you into growth.

One built on what you can control, the other built on what you must trust.

And it is at the crossroads that God often speaks the loudest, not through pressure, but through direction.

There were seasons in my life where the crossroads felt overwhelming.

Two choices. Two futures. Two versions of who I could become.

It wasn't always obvious which path was "right,"

but it was clear which path required surrender.

Crossroads reveal what you trust most. Your fear? Your past?

Your comfort? Or God?

Sometimes God asks you to walk a path that stretches you.
Sometimes He points you toward a road that feels uphill.
Sometimes He closes one direction to protect your becoming.
But He never leaves you guessing alone.

Crossroads are the places where your faith matures, where
obedience deepens,
where clarity sharpens, and where God directs your steps, one
surrendered moment at a time.

Today, if you find yourself between two paths, remember:
God doesn't abandon His children at crossroads. He guides them.

And the same God who brought you this far
will not let you choose without His hand on your shoulder.

Today's Insight

God doesn't demand clarity at the crossroads. He asks for trust.

Reflection

Take a moment to steady your spirit. These reflections will help you discern the tension, the intersection, and the choice before you. Let God reveal where He is asking you to stand.

Invite God into one decision today - big or small.

Then stay open to the nudge.

Father, meet me in this crossroads moment.

Quiet every voice that brings confusion, and amplify the one that brings peace.

Help me trust You more than my understanding.

Guide my steps, order my path, and give me courage to choose the way You're pointing.

Declaration

“God guides my steps. I will follow the path He prepares.”

Faith Activation

Stand with your feet slightly apart.

Take one step forward - slowly, intentionally.

As you step, say softly: **“Lord, I follow Your lead.”**

Let your movement mirror your surrender.

DAY 17: THE BRIDGE

Scripture

*"The Lord will guide you always...
You will be called the Repairer of Broken Walls,
Restorer of Streets with Dwellings."*

- Isaiah 58:11–12

Devotional

There are seasons when God doesn't just heal you.
He turns you into a bridge for others.

A bridge is built between two places: where you've been,
and where God is taking others.

In my life, the very gaps I fell through became the gaps God
equipped me to help others cross.

That's the power of redemption:

God takes what once broke you and uses it as the blueprint for
someone else's breakthrough.

But bridges aren't glamorous.

Bridges carry weight. They stand in tension.

They hold space between differences, between systems & souls,
between pain & possibility.

And bridges are built from the places you've survived.

Maybe God has placed you between two worlds: your past and
your future,

your family and your calling, your struggle and your testimony, your healing and the healing of others.

Being a bridge can feel stretching, but it is holy work.

A bridge doesn't choose who walks across it. It simply remains available.

You don't have to be perfect to be a bridge. You just have to be willing.

And today, if God is positioning you between two places, know this:

He trusts you.

He is strengthening you.

And He is using your life to build a way where others saw none.

Today's Insight

God turns the places you survived into pathways for others to cross.

Reflection

Slow your breathing & picture your life spanning two places. These questions are to help you see how your story connects others to hope. Let them illuminate the bridge you are becoming.

Reflection Questions

3. *Who is God allowing to walk across the bridge my life has become?*

Do one small act of encouragement today for someone walking a path you once walked.

Lord, thank You for turning my pain into purpose.

Thank You for trusting me to stand in places where others feel lost.

Strengthen me to be a bridge of hope, healing, and direction.

In Jesus’ Name, Amen.

Declaration

“My story is a bridge God uses to help others find their way.”

Faith Activation

Stretch your arms gently outward as if spanning two points.

Whisper:

“Lord, use my life as a bridge for someone today.”

Let this become your offering and your availability.

DAY 18: THE MANTLE

Scripture

"Elisha picked up the cloak that had fallen from Elijah and went back and stood on the bank of the Jordan."

- 2 Kings 2:13

Devotional

There are moments in life when God places something on your shoulders -
not a burden, but a mantle.

A mantle is not about status. It's not about visibility. It's not about position. A mantle is about continuation: God entrusting you to carry forward what someone else faithfully carried.

Sometimes that someone is a parent.

Sometimes it's a mentor, pastor, or spiritual guide.

Sometimes it's a community or a generation that never got the chance to finish what God started in them.

And sometimes, the mantle comes from the places you once suffered.

You inherit the assignment to break what broke you.

You inherit the calling to heal what harmed you.

You inherit the purpose to rebuild what collapsed around you.

I remember seasons when I felt the mantle fall:
the weight of responsibility, the awareness of calling,
the sense that God was trusting me with something bigger than myself.

Not to replace those who came before me,

but to honor them. To continue the work. To carry the flame further.

Mantles do not fall by accident. They fall by alignment. God places them on hearts that are humble enough to receive them and courageous enough to carry them.

If you feel a new weight, a new responsibility, a new clarity, a new compassion, or a new urgency rising in your spirit, it may be the mantle God is placing on your life.

You don't have to carry it alone.
You just have to carry it faithfully.

Today's Insight

A mantle is not given to elevate you - it is given to continue what God began.

Reflection

Rest your shoulders for a moment. These reflections will help you recognize the mantle God has placed upon you-what you've inherited, what you carry, and what you're becoming. Let each question rest on you gently.

Reflection Questions

Faith Activation

Lay your hands gently on your shoulders and say softly:

Feel the weight - not as pressure, but as purpose.

DAY 19: THE WHY

Scripture

*"For we are God's workmanship, created in Christ Jesus to do good works,
which God prepared in advance for us to do."*

- Ephesians 2:10

Devotional

At some point in your journey, you will come face-to-face with your **why** -

the deeper reason behind your calling, your survival, your transformation,
and the chapters of your life that didn't make sense at the time.

Your *why* is not your job. Your *why* is not your platform.

Your *why* is not your achievements or your resume.

Your *why* is the God-given purpose that threads through your entire story -

the part of you heaven knew long before the world did.

For years, I lived without understanding my *why*.

I knew pain. I knew survival. I knew hard lessons and dark seasons.

But I didn't yet know purpose.

Purpose only made sense in hindsight, when God began to show me that every scar held meaning, every valley held instruction, every setback held preparation.

Your why is born in places you didn't choose.
It grows in places you didn't expect. It reveals itself in timing you can't control.

Your why explains why you survived, why you're still standing,
why your heart still breaks for certain people,
why certain experiences changed you,
and why you can't shake the sense that your life has weight.

God prepared works in advance for you.
Not generic works, not accidental works,
but works that only your story could equip you to carry.

Finding your why is not about discovering something new.
It's about recognizing what God has been doing in you all along.

Your why is already inside you.
It's time to name it.

Today's Insight

Your why is hidden inside the places God healed, strengthened,
and transformed you.

Reflection

Bring your awareness inward. These questions are designed to help you rediscover the heart behind your work, your service, and your calling. Let them rekindle the fire within you.

Reflection Questions

Show me the purpose You planted in my spirit long before I knew You.

Help me see how my story, my pain, my passion, and my gifts are woven together by Your design. Give me courage to walk in the why You've entrusted to me.

In Jesus' Name, Amen.

Declaration

"My life carries purpose. My why is God-given and God-guided."

Faith Activation

Place your hand over your heart and whisper:

"Lord, awaken my why."

Let your spirit open to the purpose God has been shaping in you.

DAY 20: THE ASSIGNMENT

Scripture

"The One who calls you is faithful, and He will do it."
- 1 Thessalonians 5:24

Devotional

Every calling has a why, and every why eventually becomes an assignment - a specific work God entrusts to your hands.

Assignments aren't random. They are precise. They are purposeful. They are connected to the parts of your story God has redeemed and the gifts He has shaped within you.

Many people know they are called, but they never step into the assignment because they are waiting to feel qualified. But assignments rarely come when you feel ready; they come when your heart is willing.

There were seasons in my life when my assignment seemed far bigger than my capacity. I didn't see how my experiences could be used by God. I didn't understand why He would choose me. But God reminded me of something simple yet life-changing:

"I do not call the qualified. I qualify the called."

Your assignment isn't about perfection. It's about obedience. It's about showing up each day with the surrender to say: ***"Lord, use me as I am, and shape me as You will."***

Assignments may stretch you.

They may challenge you. They may take you places you never expected.

But they will always bring you closer to who God created you to be.

And here is the truth that brings peace:

If God gave you the assignment,

He will give you the strength to carry it.

You don't have to do it alone.

You don't have to know every step.

Your job is faithfulness.

God's job is fulfillment.

Today's Insight

Your assignment is not sustained by your ability - but by God's faithfulness.

Reflection

Pause in the presence of God. These reflections will help you identify where heaven is directing your steps. Let each question clarify the work entrusted to your hands.

Reflection Questions

1. *What assignment do I sense God placing on my heart in this season?*

2. *What step of obedience is God asking me to take?*

Do one small act today that aligns with your assignment, even a tiny step is movement in God's direction.

Lord, thank You for the assignment You have entrusted to me. Give me clarity to see it, courage to walk in it, and strength to carry it.

Declaration

"I am equipped, empowered, and assigned by God."

Faith Activation

Open your hands and lift them slightly as if offering something to God.

Whisper:

"Lord, I say yes to the assignment You've placed on my life."

Let your yes become your surrender and your strength.

DAY 21: THE HARVEST

Scripture

"Let us not become weary in doing good, for at the proper time we will reap a harvest if we do not give up."

- Galatians 6:9

Devotional

Every seed you've sown in faith, every prayer, every act of obedience, every quiet "yes," every tear in the secret place, every step you took when strength was low, none of it has been wasted.

God is a Lord of the harvest.

He does not overlook the seeds His children plant in the dark, nor does He forget the sacrifices that cost you something.

But here's the truth many overlook:

Harvest doesn't always look like what we imagined, but it always looks like what God promised.

Sometimes harvest is healing. Sometimes it's peace. Sometimes it's breakthrough.

Sometimes it's restoration. Sometimes it is clarity, direction, or inner strength.

Sometimes it's fruit that grows quietly but steadily in your character.

In my own life, the harvest didn't arrive all at once. It came in stages: a relationship restored, a door opened, a calling unfolding, a purpose clear. And each harvest reminded me that God is faithful, even in the seasons I thought He was silent.

Harvest is not a reward. It is a result. A result of trusting God when you couldn't see the outcome. A result of sowing good when life felt hard. A result of choosing faith over fear, obedience over comfort, and resilience over quitting.

And the Scripture is clear: **“At the proper time...”** Not early. Not late. Not rushed. Not delayed. But *appointed*.

If you are in a season where you sense something shifting, something breaking open, something blossoming in ways you didn't expect. Take heart.

You are stepping into harvest.

Today's Insight

Harvest comes to those who kept walking even when the ground felt barren.

Reflection

Breathe with expectation. These questions are meant to help you see the fruit of what God has been cultivating in you. Receive the insight with gratitude.

Reflection Questions

1. *What harvest do I see growing in my life right now - whether big or small?*
2. *Where did I persist in faith even when the results were invisible?*
3. *What fruit do I sense God bringing forth in this season?*

Daily Practice

name it out loud as your "first fruit."

DAY 22: THE FORWARD

Scripture

*"Forget the former things;
do not dwell on the past.
See, I am doing a new thing!
Now it springs up; do you not perceive it?"*
- **Isaiah 43:18–19**

Devotional

Every journey with God brings you to a threshold, a moment where you stand at the edge of what has been and the beginning of what will be. This is that moment.

For 22 days, God has been revealing, healing, lifting, shaping, and restoring you.

He has spoken identity over you. He has breathed life into weary places.

He has reminded you of your why, strengthened you in your assignment,

and positioned you at the crossroads of possibility and purpose.

And now, He is calling you forward.

Forward into clarity. Forward into courage. Forward into obedience. Forward into identity.

Forward into calling. Forward into a story that is still unfolding in grace.

Moving forward with God doesn't mean the past disappears.

It means the past loses the power to define you. Forward is not a

destination. it's a posture. A way of living. A decision you make daily to believe that God is not finished writing your story.

There were many times in my life when the forward felt impossible; when fear, failure, or shame tried to anchor me to old chapters. But God kept whispering, **"Move with Me."**

Forward often begins as a small step: a decision to trust, a willingness to try again, a readiness to believe in the unseen, a quiet yes that shifts the atmosphere inside you.

And this is the truth you carry into the next season: If God is calling you forward, He has already gone ahead of you. You don't walk alone. You don't walk unprepared. You don't walk unsure. You walk with the One who knows the way.

The future is not something to fear. It is something God has already prepared.

This is your moment to step into it.

Today's Insight

Forward is not a feeling - it's a faith step. And God meets you in the step.

Reflection

Let your heart open to possibility. These reflections will guide you to look ahead with hope, courage, and clarity. Let God speak into your next steps as you answer.

Reflection Questions

1. *What part of my past am I ready to stop carrying into my future?*
2. *Where do I sense God calling me to take a step forward?*
3. *What does moving forward with God look like for me right now?*

Daily Practice

Do something today, even something small - that aligns with the future you believe God is leading you into. Forward movement begins with one intentional act.

Write this down: My next forward step with God is:

Prayer

*Father, thank You for walking with me through these 22 days.
Thank You for healing, revealing, strengthening, and directing my steps.*

*Today I choose to move forward with You. Not in fear, but in faith;
not in hesitation, but in trust.*

Lead me into the new thing You have prepared.

Make my spirit sensitive, my steps steady, and my heart courageous.

In Jesus' Name, Amen.

Declaration

“I move forward with God. My future is full, prepared, and guided by Him.”

Faith Activation

Take one physical step forward - even right where you are.
As you step, whisper:

“Lord, I step into the future You have prepared for me.”

Let that moment mark a spiritual shift.

Benediction

Beloved,

As you finish these 22 days, I want you to pause and recognize something profound:

God has been walking with you every step of the way.

He has spoken to your heart, touched the places that needed healing,
revealed truths you may have forgotten,
and strengthened the parts of you that were growing weary.

My prayer for you now is simple, but it carries weight:

May the same God who met you in these pages
meet you in the days ahead with fresh strength, unexpected
peace,
and a steady sense of His presence.

May He remind you daily that:

- you are chosen, you are covered
- you are carried, you are becoming
- and you are called for such a time as this.

I bless you with courage to walk into the new things God is unfolding.

I bless you with clarity to recognize His voice above every other.

I bless you with peace that leads, not pressure that pushes.

I bless you with joy that cannot be shaken and hope that cannot be stolen.

And as you step into the next chapter of your life,
may you see God's fingerprints on everything:

in the doors He opens, in the people He sends,
in the healing He completes, and in the future He is preparing for
you even now.

You are not leaving this devotional alone.
You are leaving it accompanied, strengthened, and reassigned.

May God's grace go before you,
may His mercy surround you,
and may His love sustain you
as you move forward in faith.

THE EXECUTIVE WHO BUILDS WHAT OTHERS SAID COULDN'T BE BUILT

Pastor Troy F. Vaughn is widely regarded as one of the nation's most innovative architects of community transformation. He is a turnaround strategist, systems builder, and visionary executive whose leadership has reshaped the landscape of homelessness, reentry, healthcare, and restorative justice.

From his earliest leadership roles to his most pivotal executive appointments, Pastor Troy became known for stepping into assignments others had abandoned and constructing models of hope where systems had collapsed. He also led the Los Angeles Mission through major program expansions and facility redesigns.

Throughout healthcare, behavioral health, homelessness, and reentry sectors, Pastor Troy F. Vaughn led some of California's most challenging turnarounds. He rescued a struggling community clinic from court receivership, securing \$1.5 million in emergency support and developing a new 6,500-square-foot clinic and administrative campus. During his tenure with the Weingart Center Association, he helped drive a 50 percent compound growth rate and a 25 percent annual profit increase through strategic restructuring. At LAMP Community, he expanded government funding by an unprecedented 87 percent in just seven months, and at Shields for Families he secured more than \$4 million in new government revenue within a single year. These were not merely

administrative successes; they represented life-changing expansions in shelter, healthcare, and recovery resources for people who needed them most.

For more than twenty-five years, Pastor Troy F. Vaughn has embodied transformational leadership at the intersection of faith, community development, health equity, restorative justice, and systems reform. His rise from lived experiences of homelessness, incarceration, addiction, and despair to becoming one of Los Angeles' most trusted visionary leaders has shaped a testimony that fuels national models of hope, innovation, and community rebirth. Through God's redeeming hand, he transformed his personal journey into a blueprint for systemic change, one that continues to touch thousands of lives each year.

Housing the Unhoused with Dignity

As Co-Founder, President and CEO of Christ-Centered Ministries (CCM), Pastor Troy became a leading designer of dignity-centered housing across Los Angeles County. His signature approach, known to many as **“Dignity by Design,”** reimagines outdated and institutional environments into restorative, healing spaces where safety, value, and humanity are honored. Under his direction, CCM and its network of partners have provided an array of housing and supportive services, including bridge housing, permanent supportive housing, recovery housing, faith-integrated community housing, and enhanced transitional living for individuals returning from incarceration.

Pastor Troy's developments reflect his belief that dignity is foundational to transformation. He has designed multiple housing projects that offer safe, stable environments for people experiencing homelessness or reentering society after incarceration, and he has been a leading voice in championing

restorative design in environments long neglected. His community-based living facilities expand access to case management, peer navigation, workforce opportunities, and wraparound care. Through these initiatives, hundreds of individuals and families have moved into stable homes where they could begin not only to survive, but to rebuild their lives with hope and purpose.

Builder of Social Micro-Enterprises That Change Economies

Pastor Troy F. Vaughn is also a pioneer in the creation of social micro-enterprises; small but powerful economic engines designed to employ, encourage and empower justice-impacted and unhoused individuals. At the Weingart Center, he conceived and launched 360 Solutions, which generated \$1.5 million in revenue within its first two years. His more recent endeavor, Manna Feast Enterprises, exceeded even that impact, producing more than \$3.7 million in revenue in its first twenty-four months while creating twenty-seven new jobs. He also oversees Pit Stop, a transitional employment model that provides work for more than seventy men and women.

These enterprises reflect his belief that people do not merely need help, they need opportunity. Through workforce development, transferable skill-building, income stability, and diverse pathways to economic independence, Pastor Troy's initiatives restore dignity and expand economic mobility. They reinvest resources back into communities that have long been marginalized, creating cycles of empowerment rather than dependency. His micro-enterprise model demonstrates that true transformation includes the restoration of economic agency.

Healthcare Reform Through Community

Recognizing the profound inequities and inequalities in healthcare access for underserved populations, Pastor Troy F. Vaughn helped establish and strengthen community clinics and integrated care models tailored to individuals returning from incarceration, people experiencing homelessness, families in crisis, and neighborhoods impacted by generational poverty. Through collaborations with healthcare networks, CalAIM, faith-based providers, and integrated care teams, he championed approaches that delivered primary care, behavioral health services, substance use treatment, mental health support, street-based outreach, and peer navigation to people often excluded from traditional care systems.

His leadership was instrumental in transforming several community clinics into fully functioning Federally Qualified Health Centers (FQHCs), including Southern California Medical Center and Centro Medico Community Clinic, where he served as CEO. He also helped lead countywide collaborations under CalAIM and supported the Office of Diversion and Reentry (ODR) in advancing whole-person, culturally responsive, trauma-informed care long before these approaches became policy priorities. Through his influence, thousands have received healthcare and healing that many accessed for the first time in their lives.

A Model of Community Transformation

Pastor Troy F. Vaughn designed one of Los Angeles' most impactful holistic service frameworks: a triad model that connects housing, employment, and healthcare. He believes that people cannot heal from trauma or rebuild their lives in isolation; true transformation requires stability, opportunity, and comprehensive care working in concert.

Under his leadership, hundreds of people have gained both part-time and full-time employment through his workforce initiatives, most notably through the groundbreaking HIRE initiative created under the State of California. Through the advocacy of the Los Angeles Regional Reentry Partnership (LARRP) with organizations like Centers for Employment Opportunity (CEO), California for Safety and Justice (CSJ), Amity Foundation, Re-Entry Association of California (REPAC), Building Opportunities for Self-Sufficiency (BOSS), and many more reentry provider organizations, this initiative was birthed.

Hundreds more have secured long-term housing through CCM and its collaborative partners. Thousands have accessed healthcare through clinics, outreach teams, treatment programs, and reentry-centered health networks he helped design. This unique integration has become recognized nationally as a best practice in faith-led, community-based restorative and transformative housing models.

A Leader Who Changes Systems, Not Just Stories

Beyond direct service, Pastor Troy has emerged as a powerful force in policy, advocacy, and systems reform. He has testified before the Little Hoover Commission on sentencing reform, advised city, county, state, and federal partners, and co-led reforms across homelessness, reentry, health delivery, and justice policy sectors. As CEO of the Los Angeles Regional Reentry Partnership (LARRP), one of the largest reentry coalitions in California, he has unified and guided diverse networks toward shared solutions. In 2024, he helped launch the LA County Faith Alliance, an integrated faith movement uniting churches, ministries, and faith leaders of every discipline, to restore dignity, hope, and opportunity for our most vulnerable neighbors. Together, they are demonstrating that when the faith community moves as one body, transformative change becomes possible across Los Angeles County.

Pastor Troy is widely respected as a bridge-builder, someone who connects government agencies, philanthropy, faith communities, and grassroots leaders. His leadership blends truth-telling with hope-casting, creating space where real systems change can take root.

A Pastor, Teacher, and Shepherd

As Senior Pastor of Restoration Family Worship Center, Pastor Troy ministers with a unique combination of scholarship, anointing, lived experience, and deep compassion. His sermons and pastoral guidance are spirit-filled and have ushered countless individuals into recovery, restoration, educational achievement, employment, spiritual identity, and renewed purpose. His ministry reflects his life's message: that God still redeems, God still restores, and God still resurrects.

A Legacy Rooted in Family and Faith

Beyond his public leadership, Pastor Troy is a devoted husband, father, grandfather, and spiritual father. His greatest joy is the family he cherishes and the generations he is shaping. His life stands as living proof that you can rise, you can recover, you can rebuild, and you can lead even from the ashes.
